Big Ideas:

- ☞ Drawing & painting are unique art forms that use specific mark-making processes for artistic expression.
- ☞ Refining artistic expression requires perseverance, resilience, and risk taking.
- ☞ Purposeful artistic choices enhance the depth and message in a body of work.
- ☞ Visual art is essential to building culture, expressing and exploring personal identity, and revealing insights into the human experience.
- ☞ Ideas and beliefs within a work of art have the power to effect change.

Processes and Materials

Drawing: materials may include pencil, charcoal, water soluble pencil crayon, water soluble graphite, pastel

Painting: materials may include: acrylic, watercolour, silk painting, mixed media, collage

Evaluation: Criteria for individual course projects and sketchbook are introduced when assignments are presented. The weight of individual assignments will vary depending on the depth of the outlined criteria. For example a 2 day project will be weighed differently than a more involved 3 week project.

Required Materials:

Students are to come to class prepared to work with a sketchbook, pen, pencil and an eraser each day. (many students at this level may choose to acquire some of their own tools and materials as per personal interest)

Sketchbooks: should be at least **9" x 11"**.

Sketchbooks will be collected for marking toward the end of each term. It should contain the sketchbook assignment as well as plans and ideas for the projects we will be working on in class. This is your journal as a working artist!

Course Enhancement Fee \$20.00 For provision of speciality art paper and supplies for project completion and student possession of basic projects.

Assignments & Absences:

If students are absent they should bring a note from a parent or guardian that explains the absence. Please be aware that this is a studio course where most if not all of the project work is done during class time. Missing class time severely restricts success.

Expectations:

Students are expected to be in class on time with their materials out and ready to work when the bell rings. Show respect for yourself and others. Avoid using language or actions which may embarrass another.

For safety reasons, as well as potential damage to art work. Eating is not permitted in the Art Room. Bottled water is okay. Each student is responsible for:

- bringing the required tools and equipment to class,
- proper clean up of working areas,
- returning all borrowed tools and materials in the same condition as they were borrowed,
- using supplies and equipment safely,
- having projects completed by the due date,
- following school/class rules
